FOCUS on ART

Many have been amazed by the intriguing artwork that now decorates the entrance of our building. Three talented students currently have their artwork displayed and have received countless compliments on their ability. A large number of our students are extremely talented artists whom we have long admired. Fred Evans, our Associate Director, was especially impressed and felt the artwork should be enjoyed by everyone!

Ben Carroll was our first artist displayed. Ben began his life in an orphanage in Bulgaria until he was adopted by a loving family. He was



diagnosed with Autism and spent countless sessions in Speech and Occupational Therapy while being homeschooled. When he was 10 years old he was featured on the cover of the *Journal Inquirer*, which told the story of his life and advertised his one-man art show. Ben currently attends the FOCUS Extended Day Treatment Program and has made immense progress with his social skills. We are proud of Ben in so many ways, and thank him for sharing his beautiful artwork. Ben will also be featured in an art exhibit at the Charter Oak

Cultural Center from March 4th to 26th. The Gallery opening is on March 4th from 5:30 to 7:30pm. For more information go to www.charteroakcenter.org.

We will continue to rotate the artwork of our students over the next few months. Currently Mary Bresee and Ana McGlory are also featured, along with Ben.

Although a sight to see, it is more than just art. The majority of us know how to express ourselves through our words and emotions. This helps to stabilize us and get us through hard times. For those on the Autism Spectrum this is often difficult and sometimes impossible. FOCUS artists use their artwork to communicate their feelings and to express their emotions. Let their gifts inspire you!



The Day Program Works!

Our Day Program is a wonderful work in progress and is successfully meeting the complex needs of 8 students from 8:30am-3:00pm. Our kids feel safe and happy; they are willing to face the obstacles that have made a traditional setting a non-viable option at this time in their lives. The Day Program is embedded in our clinical Extended Day Treatment Program and it continues to grow and evolve as we add new students. This program admits kids that are having a very difficult time being maintained in their current school system because of their intense social and emotional needs. Each new student brings their own creativity and makes the classroom shine even more!

In addition to their regular work the students take a Tuesday trip to the Canton Library to choose new books to read for the week. We have also begun a Home Economics program that involves basic cooking classes. The students have baked amazing treats, including M&M cookies, homemade pretzels and cake. They choose the recipes, follow the directions and add the ingredients independently, with some staff guidance. They have been proud to share their treats with their friends at FOCUS and with their families. Being able to prepare food is an essential life skill. Students are also learning to be responsible for cleaning up afterwards as well.

An essential piece of our Day Program is the social interaction our students receive. We have activities planned throughout the day that help in creating friendships and teaching social skills. Each day there is a morning meeting where daily goals are set, several sensory breaks, lunch bunch, and a structured social activity. Clinical and Direct Care Staff are an essential component for facilitation of interactions and activities.



The Spectrum Unplugged Panel ROCKS!

Our "panel of experts" is more in demand than ever, especially by school systems. With 1 in 100 children being diagnosed with an Autism Spectrum Disorder, awareness of this epidemic is increasing. School systems are now looking for the panel to help educate staff and to increase the understanding of staff and students alike of this rising problem. As Stephen Shore says, "When you have met one person with autism, you have





met one person with autism".... and that is what is at the heart of understanding these complex individuals and where the panel can really make a difference.

School can often be a difficult experience for those with Autism Spectrum Disorders and the more we are able to teach the easier the school day can be for all involved. It has been our experience that knowledge and awareness are key to breaking down barriers and promoting acceptance and understanding.

State Senator John Kissell and State Representative Matt Conway recently attended a panel presentation at Suffield High School. It was suggested that our panel present to the State Legislature to increase awareness of the myriad of issues associated with having an Autism Spectrum Disorder. FOCUS believes that education and increased awareness are essential to the development of increased services in CT and that there is no better way to do this than to attend a panel and listen to our "panel of experts!"

For the first time, the panel was asked to speak to 25 Residential Assistants at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts and they were amazed at the panel's honesty and forthrightness, especially around school experiences and bullying. One young man stated, **"I wish I had learned about this when I was younger as it would have made me a kinder peer."** Another student defined it as a **"life changing experience!**" The panel members are committed to help change the face of autism and make a difference, one day at a time.

The hard work and dedication displayed by our Head Teacher, Cheryl Fritz, and our Milieu Coordinator, Jamie Cohen have made the classroom successful. Academics, or "epidemics," as one of our kids calls it, can be very frustrating and challenging for individuals on the Autism Spectrum and our main focus is to try and teach them how to manage their frustrations and embrace their learning differences. The needs are great and we are looking to expand the program over the next few years. As we grow, we are careful to maintain our FOCUS philosophy, utilizing Milieu Therapy to address the social, emotional, and academic needs of those who are as we say, "creatively wired and socially challenged."
