15 yr old Christen Backes brings the Autism Unplugged Panel to 1000 Guilford Middle School Aged Students

In 2012 when Christen Backes was in 5th grade she attended an Unplugged Presentation at St. Raphael's Hospital with her mom. Her desire to be a special education teacher lead her to be a volunteer at High Hopes, a therapeutic riding school in Old Lyme. It was this experience that brought her to the panel that night. "The presentation was two hours and it was amazing! It made me realize how different things are and how it is not fair that people on the spectrum get treated." Christen thought the Panel's message was powerful and well worth sharing with other school kids. Christen "just wanted people to have the knowledge so they could have compassion and that they could be on the lookout for someone

who might need help."

With support from the Guilford Fund for Educa-



tion and school administrators, Christen organized and got funding to realize her dream – two school-wide assemblies at Baldwin and Adams Middle Schools on October 29, 2015! The Spectrum Unplugged Panel spoke to each school for 45 minutes describing their experiences of life on the autism spectrum to help the audience gain awareness and compassion.

Washington House

Our new Supportive Housing Program for young adults with autism and mental illness opened in July 2015.

Formerly a DMHAS funded group residence in Simsbury for three young adults, the program moved to Torrington where our good friends from The Corporation for Independent Living renovated a three unit apartment building. Adam Cohen, the Program Director, was responsible for moving and transitioning this innovative program to its new site. The program now houses six young adults!



The building allows for 24/7 support staff to be on the property. Our clients are learning to live with more independence and self-reliance. The six young

adults love the freedom they are experiencing and are now able to walk all around town. With supports in place, they are now able to live more independently.



Something fishy is happening in the Day Program

This is the second year that our Day Program students are hatching trout. The 55 gallon tank with siphons and a cooling unit is located right in the classroom. The children help to monitor water quality and assist with

feeding. When the fish grow into fingerlings they are ready for release into local streams in late spring. Release day is a favorite FOCUS field trip to the Farmington river where the sense of accomplishment is evident. This important program helps foster a conservation ethic and an understanding of our eco system connectivity. After School Program: where friends happen!

FOCUS first started with our successful After School Program over 15 years ago. From 3pm-6pm, Mon-Fri, Sandy Kissel, MSN has been there to oversee the hundreds of children that have come through its doors. Under her direction it has



become a truly amazing program!
As one of the first programs of its kind designed to serve children with autism spectrum disorders (ASD), the After School Program provides a sense of belonging and community in a safe haven free of the day's stresses. Likened to a "social incubator," the program provides a judgement free zone

New 1 in 45 study causes concern.

In November 2015 the CDC published the results of a new parent survey* stating that 1 in 45 (or 2%) children in the US have been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

When the news broke, Fox 61 called the experts at FOCUS Center for Autism. John Charlton, Fox 61 reporter, came out a few hours later to interview staff about autism and their thoughts on the new report.

The panel (Sandy Kissel, Program Director; Dan Lenois, Team Leader for the Unplugged Panel; Alex Cable; and Sharon Cable, Alex's mom) spoke about life on the Autism Spectrum. The focus was to give new insights on autism in the workplace, to show what strategies work and don't work with our population, as well as, bring awareness to what it is like to live with autism. The group talked about sensory challenges, the importance of being understood and having a sense of belonging.
