Brightwood: New Beginnings



FOCUS's newest venture is the program we have started at our location on Brightwood Ave, in Torrington. This two-family home was purchased and renovated by our long time FOCUS friendly landlord. We are indebted to him for becoming our autism friendly landlord. We were able to move two graduates from our Washington House Supportive Housing Program into the first floor of this Brightwood home. These young adults, Jesse and Jason, still receive support services but are now able to live much more independently and are learning to become more self-reliant. With the help of Nick, our Young Adult Transition Coordinator, and the staff at Washington House, they are doing fantastic!



The second-floor apartment has become the solution to our space problem at Washington House. With very little meeting space available, we are utilizing the second floor at Brightwood for groups, activities, and meetings. The pandemic isolation affected our residents in terms of their autism and their mental health. Staff too were feeling the effects of virtual meetings and the loss of a sense of team. This new space allows us to use the space for social



clubs and groups including cooking and healthy eating, arts and crafts, movie night, and a regularly scheduled walking group. Outside we also have space for barbecues and gardening.

Staff are now able to get together utilizing the space for clinical and staff meetings. Having this space to meet has been invigorating for everyone and the effects can be seen throughout the program.

This second-floor space has become a unique opportunity. We are now able to offer more in-house program activities. These activities really help residents with making connections, establishing relationships, and improving their overall social learning IQ. We are grateful to all who helped make this a FOCUS one-of-a-kind program!

Workforce Development

FOCUS is honored to have been awarded a grant from the Northwest Community Bank Foundation. The funds will be used to create and implement a Workforce Development Program for adults with autism that are falling through the cracks and currently not receiving employment support. This program will include one to one job coaching and other supports to assist participants in learning the skills needed for obtaining and maintaining job or volunteer positions.





Making a Difference One Voice at a Time

This past spring, the panel hosted a threecourse series of virtual presentations for the Connecticut Department of Children and Families. Participants in the course learn firsthand about autism, anxiety, the effects of trauma, and the strategies to help manage them.

During these presentations, our panelists,

comprised of professionals, clinicians, and people with autism, shared their experiences, talked about the power of relationships, how to recognize anxiety symptoms, and what strategies work best for them.

Conversations are raw, honest, and insightful. For two of our panelists, this series was their FOCUS Autism Spectrum Unplugged panel debuts. They shared their unique experiences, participated in meaningful conversations, and shared new insights.

A DCF participant shared, "I thought the young men on the panel did a wonderful job at articulating what life is like for them, obstacles, and their own individual strengths."

In May, we had our first in-person panel in two years, speaking in Suffield to over 300 enthusiastic McAllister Intermediate School students between 3rd and 5th grade. They were the most fantastic audience. Their kindness, amazing questions, and feedback were wise beyond their years.

This FOCUS Autism Spectrum Unplugged panel presenting to McAllister students was comprised of teens, Johnny and McKenzie, and adults Alex and Jesse, who shared their experiences of living with autism alongside clinician Dan, parent Sharon, and FOCUS founder Donna. Our panel was glowing and so proud to help students understand autism and how to create a school environment accepting and inclusive to all - learning from those who understand the unique needs of the spectrum best - the panel!

We are so proud of our panelists for their bravery and honesty in sharing their stories to help educate others!

Advocacy at Fresh Start School

Democracy is like a practice sport, and our students are getting in the game! The Fresh Start School took our civics class to our State Capitol in April. Our Canton representative, Representative Kavros Degraw made a special visit, further encouraging our students to advocate for their needs and passions. Our students toured the Capitol and learned about its history and how it functions today.

During our civics class, we met with the advocacy team at Autism Speaks. Their advocacy team encouraged our students to advocate for their needs reminding our students that they are the experts in their stories and that their voices matter.

Our students put their advocacy skills to use when we welcomed Congresswoman Jahana Hayes during a special visit in May. Students engaged in a conversation with her on the need for the expansion of adult services and proper training for police departments on how to interact with individuals with autism.





The students loved having the opportunity to talk to her and wished she could have stayed longer because she was so personable. She spoke on the importance of the need for more support for individuals with autism, especially adults after leaving a transition program.


